Kneehill County residents upset

Kneehill County is moving ahead with plans to bring water from the Town of Drumheller's water treatment plant to rural residents.

Phase 1 of the Water Service Area (WSA) Rural Distribution Line and the WSA reservoir to be built near Carbon went to tender on Dec. 17, 2007 and the tender closed on Jan. 28, 2008.

On Monday, March 31, 2008 representatives from Tekton Construction, which was the successful bidder for the construction of the reservoir. Kneehill county councillors, and representatives from EXH Engineering Service Ltd., which has been hired to do the detailed design of the water distribution system and associated reservoirs/pumphouses for Kneehill County, met just northwest of Carbon at the site of the newly proposed reservoir for a ground breaking ceremony and photo op.

Kevin Miner, chief administrative officer for Kneehill County, said that the plans are progressing on schedule for the water project.

"Phase 1 went out to tender for the distribution line and the fresh reservoir site," Miner said.

"We are working on the engineering work for Phase 2 now. We are hoping by the end of July it should be out to tender."

EnCana denies doing any water well contamination

EnCana is not responsible for water well contamination in the Rosebud area, according to representatives from the company.

According to Allan Boras, man media relations for EnCana, the company follow's strict regulations set out by the Alberta Energy Resources Conservation Board and Alberta Environment.

"We have been working in that area for decades," Boras said.

Drilling for natural gas is like drilling through layers of blankets set over the centuries in the ground, Boras added.

In order to get at the natural gas, EnCana

must drill below the surface through layers, or blankets, of sand and coal and sometimes drilling through layers which contain water.


Nearby landowners use these relatively shallow layers of water for household use.

Government regulations followed by EnCana state precautions must be taken, like cementing pipes used to extract natural gas in

EnCana also has their own regulations which they follow.

"We can't do completion of shallow gas wells above 200 metres," Boras said, meaning that EnCana will not take natural gas out of the ground anywhere before 200 metres in depth.

EnCana says it met with the landowners

Most of the water wells in Rosebud are at a depth of 50-60 metres which makes it necessary for them to be drilled through.

During the years spent in the area, EnCana has met with landowners in the area including the new group of eight concerned landowners which came forward recently.

Meetings of all sizes have taken place including one-on-one discussions, group meetings and public meetings. "We have had extensive discussions with this group of eight," Boras said.

Complaints by landowners in the area regarding their drinking water are being taken seriously and investigated.

Evaluations by independent third parties have been done on the wells in question, according to Pores

"Independent government agencies have done extensive work in that area," Boras said

Mark Dubord, a hydro-geologist with EnCana, said that the company samples water wells according to Energy Resources Conservation Board D-35 regulations.

"We don't sample water wells after drilling unless concerns by the owner are raised," Dubord said.

Boras also added that all documentation regarding Rosebud's wells will be made available to the public by EnCana shortly.
